Allow students, in groups or individually, to examine the broadside located at the above link while answering the questions below in order. The questions are designed to guide students into a deeper analysis of the source and sharpen associated cognitive skills.

Level I: Description

1. When was this broadside printed?
2. What event is the broadside telling us about?

Level II: Interpretation

1. Who do you think the audience is, for this broadside?
2. What do you notice about who is writing the article?

Level III: Analysis

1. How do you think the people of Preble County reacted to this broadside?
2. What exactly is the celebration about, emancipation or freedom?
