Allow students, in groups or individually, to examine the document located at the above link while answering the questions below in order. The questions are designed to guide students into a deeper analysis of the source and sharpen associated cognitive skills.

## **Level I: Description (pertains to postcard)**

- 1. Who is featured in this postcard?
- 2. What symbols are used in this postcard? Are the symbols easy or hard to identify?
- 3. What is the slogan on the postcard?

## <u>Level II: Interpretation (pertains to postcard)</u>

- 1. Who do you think this type of postcard was intended to be sent to? How did you come to this conclusion?
- 2. Look at the woman's facial expression in the postcard. How would you describe her expression? Why?

## Level III: Analysis (pertains to postcard and Great Seal)

- 1. Carefully examine both primary sources. Compare and contrast the two sources. What symbols are similar and what symbols are different?
- 2. Make an inference. Why do you think the woman suffrage movement decided to use this type of design on the postcard?
- 3. Do you think the symbols used in the postcard were effective? Explain your answer.
- 4. If you lived during the time when women didn't have the right to vote, would you change any of the features or symbols used in the postcard? Explain your answer.
