My Dear Comm. Byrd,

I received your letter of September 27 inst. and was glad to know that you have added my name to the list of those who are volunteering for to go with you on you expedition.

I know you are tired of reading letters from people who want to be included in this expedition, but to let you know I am really interested and anxious to go with you I am writing again.

I know you are looking for men who are reliable, and men who you really can trust in the face of all hardships and under all circumstances that may be therein on this Antarctic Expedition. I am one of them, I am made of real stuff and you will believe my statement having known where I came from. Was born and brought up in the northern peninsula of Newfoundland. I can send you a recommendation from the Hudson River Day Line that will prove my statement to you since working here and I also can give you reference from people in Newfoundland where I came from, who will back my statement there.

I have knocked around quiet a bit in Newfoundland before I came to this country in 1924. My chief occupations there were fishing and sailoring in the summer and fall. In the Winter and Spring, when everything were frozen up with snow and ice, I was driving dogs and I can truthfully say I well know my business in either one of these trades which I have been engaged.
