My dear Commander,

Your letter about the Congressional Medals has been forwarded and reached me this morning. It is indeed gratifying to feel that you think me worthy of a gold medal. To be so honored by one's Country is becoming to just a few, and I cannot help but feel that you have overestimated my services. This medal I shall prize beyond any words of description.

I have come to Philadelphia to learn the fundamentals of advertising and hope that someday I shall be able to serve N. W. Ayer in the capacity of a representative.

This course of training should not last longer than Christmas time, when I hope to be able to be promoted to the position of a representative, and eventually work out of the Boston office.

At about January first of 1932, it will be necessary to make very definite moves toward the preparation of our dog department for the next expedition, if we leave in October of 1932. At about this time, we must begin to collect the dogs which must be of a larger and more northerly type than the majority we had on our last trips. I want more dogs like Moody, and

With three hundred hand selected and actually tested dogs we will be able to do anything for you. But the secret will be to start early and prepare this department as thoroughly as you do your aviation unit, which never has a miss.

I have outlined in my room here at Philadelphia a plan of preparation which I would like to either send to you or talk over with you very soon. It includes the ways we should get the dogs, and the kind of equipment we should get for this department.

For the books which you are now compiling, I have written something

about the work of the dogs on the trail. I thought
Eddie should take up details of equipment on the
trail, a great problem confronting every polar explorer,
and Freddie, the results of a portable radio receiver
and transmitter
on the trail. When would you like this data
sent to you?

I hope you are getting your very
well-deserved vacation. But a vacation for you is
always work. Break away for a short time
anyway and get a rest.

Your address at Amherst College, where
you used the theme "The Three Musketeers" was a
great tribute to all three of us, and for it I give
you many thanks. The article, I have returned
to Miss Campbell at 9 Brunner Street.
