Level 2: Interpretation

- 1. Why does the mother look so sad even though she has three children?
- 2. Why is the older lady just sitting there with her possessions in the open?
- 3. How does the gentleman use his possessions in order to survive?

Level 3: Analysis

- 1. Which of these photos gives the most vivid description of the Great Depression? Why?
- 2. What do the photos tell you about the people's morale during the Great Depression?
- 3. What does the clothing and possessions tell you about the climate in California? Why would this be important during the Great Depression?
