Allow students, in groups or individually, to examine the photograph while answering the questions below in order. The questions are designed to guide students into a deeper analysis of the source and sharpen associated cognitive skills.

Level I: Description

- 1. What kind of transportation is represented in the photograph?
- 2. What buildings do you see in the picture?
- 3. What is the covered area with the pillars to the left of the train?

Level II: Interpretation

- 1. Why do you think there were so many tracks in this photograph?
- 2. What kinds of things would have been transported on these trains?
- 3. Is the train standing still or moving? How can you tell?

Level III: Analysis

- 1. What kinds of dangers would be involved with trains and train terminals?
- 2. Why were large train terminal important to the life of large cities in America?
- 3. By the 1950s, train terminals like these were not very busy. What changed in America to reduce the need for this kind of transportation?
